Information about Budapest

That Budapest - one of the most beautiful cities in the world – has developed where it is, is not down to some historical accident. Take a look at Gellért Hill, right next to the River Danube as it flows majestically through the centre of the modern city. It was precisely the combination of the relative ease of crossing the River here and the natural protection the hill offered against invasion that decided the earliest settlers it was the ideal place to build a town. The Eravisci, a tribe of highly cultured Celts, had already settled at Gellért Hill in the third and fourth centuries B.C. They worked with iron, decorated their earthenware pots and even minted their own coins. Later, the Romans built a settlement at today's Óbuda. They called it Aquincum and it was an important station along the limes which ran alongside the River Danube.

The halls of the course is located in the city centre near Astoria. It can be reached with almost every mean of transport. It has a metro station, and more than 6 buslines halts near the campus. This is one of the most central places in the city. One can find the maps and timetables at www.bkv.hu

Pécs2010 European Capital of Culture



This year Pécs is one of the culture capitals of Europe, and we would like to draw your attention to the events, you could visit at one of the weekends of ESU.

Pécs, the fifth largest settlement in Hungary, is a two thousand year-old city with a sub-Mediterranean climate, a cosmopolitan gastronomy and deservedly famous light white and fine red wines in its neighbourhood, built at the meeting point of major roads and cultures where numerous monuments of the Roman age, the Middle Ages, the Turkish occupation and the achievements of the middle-class, still visible today, have been built on or next to each other.

Pécs was placed second in the category of cities with a population between 75,000 and 200,000 in the international competition of Liveable Cities held in November 2008 and in which 30 cities from all over the world took part.

The early Christian underground city, the Mosque, the Minaret, the Turkish chapel, small houses of market gardeners, palaces decorated with Zsolnay ceramics and the relics of Bauhaus architecture all contribute to the exciting and colourful character of this city. Thanks to the richest Roman finds in the entire Central European region, in 2000 the historic centre of Pécs was included in the UNESCO World Heritage list of universal cultural values.
